"Stories of Resilience and Achievement, Ittesama Khatun and Jahira Khatun's Inspirational Journeys"

Ittesama Khatun and Jahira Khatun, two remarkable young girls from different backgrounds, share a common thread of resilience and achievement over adversity.

Ittesama's early life was marked by complications, leaving her without a cry at birth.



Her family discovered her challenges when she was four, struggling with communication, eye contact, and hearing and speech problems. These difficulties were compounded by her elder brother's hearing impairment, causing deep distress for her family. Their relentless effort led them to the Asha Bhavan Centre through our Community-based Rehabilitation project. At seven, Ittesama was admitted, and her journey towards transformation began. Lacking effective communication and social skills, she heavily depended on others for daily tasks. The dedicated staff at Asha Bhavan conducted assessments and counseling sessions, diagnosing her with mild mental retardation along with a speech disorder. Through comprehensive rehabilitation planning, Ittesama's life took a dramatic turn. She is now thriving, preparing for class XI, excelling in sports like badminton and football, and even achieving success in Special Olympics tournaments. She was selected for Team India in the Special Olympics Unified Football Cup in Detroit 2022, a testament to her incredible potential and unwavering support.

Jahira's journey is equally inspiring. Hailing from an impoverished village, she faced the challenges of mild mental retardation from a young age. At 11, she entered the Asha Bhavan Centre and underwent a remarkable transformation. Through assessments, counseling, and specialized education, Jahira developed into an independent and socially adapt individual. She excelled in academics, learned essential life skills, and even emerged as a champion in sports like badminton and football, representing her team with pride. She received accolades like the "Birangana Puraskar 2020" and the State Award in 2021 for her remarkable sporting achievements. Most notably, she represented India in the Special Olympics Unified Football Cup in Detroit 2022, a testament to her dedication and progress.

Both Ittesama and Jahira's stories embody the power of resilience, determination, and the invaluable support provided by the Asha Bhavan Centre. They serve as beacons of hope, illustrating how individuals with disabilities can overcome obstacles and realize their full potential with the right guidance and unwavering determination.

Child Care Institution

Children's Home for Children with Special Needs under Mission Vatsalaya Scheme, Gol.

Asha Bhavan Centre operates Child Care Institutions known as Children's Homes, which cater to Girls with Special Needs (CWSN). These homes provide shelter and care for abandoned, surrendered, trafficked, and orphaned children, as well as those from families unable to care for them. They are located in Kathila, within the Howrah District, and Keoradanga, in the South 24 Parganas District, following the Mission Vatsalya Scheme guidelines. Both of these Children's Homes are registered under The Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection of Children) Act, 2015.

The Kathila Children's Home has the PAB approved three-unit capacity to accommodate up to 150 girls with disabilities, while the Keoradanga Children's Home can house 50 girls with disabilities one unit. This project operates as a partnership between the Government of India and civil society organizations. Its primary objective is to provide comprehensive rehabilitation services tailored to the individual needs of these children with disabilities. This includes services such as Special Education, Formal Education, Non-Formal Education, Speech Therapy, Pre-Vocational and Vocational training, Counseling, Behavioral Management, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Medical Care, and Recreational Activities like Dance, Music, Yoga, as well as both indoor and outdoor games. Additionally, children are provided with artificial aids and appliances to support their unique needs.

The Project is running through the support from Government and Civil Society partnership. In our Kathila campus the Associazione Amici di Dominique Lapierre, Ticino, Switzerland and The Keoradanga campus Supported by Lumilo Foundation and Mr. Pierre Jacot, Switzerland.



On 2nd December 2022 in the eve of International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD) Ittesama Khatun received best Sports Person Award 2022 in the category of Intellectual disability Conferred by Dr. Shashi Panja, Ministry in-Charge, Department of Women & Child Development and Social Welfare, Govt. of West Bengal.

The Special School for children with intellectual disabilities creates a nurturing and supportive atmosphere where students can excel both academically and socially. This institution is instrumental in guaranteeing that every child, regardless of their cognitive challenges, is afforded the chance to maximize their potential and enjoy a rewarding life.

School of Excellence for Children with Special Needs, Supported by Associazione Amici di Dominique Lapierre (ADL) Ticino, Switzerland.

In addition to our specialized school dedicated to children with Intellectual Disabilities (ID), which receives support from the DDRS scheme, we proudly operate a special education program designed to cater to children with various disabilities. This initiative is generously funded by Association ADL, Switzerland and is currently benefiting 107 children who are dealing with Hearing Impairment (HI), Locomotor and Other Disabilities.

At the heart of our program, we have a team of dedicated, RCI qualified special educators and compassionate caregivers. Together, they work diligently to provide tailored, individualized education that is finely tuned to the unique needs of each child. Our approach is rooted in utilizing a standardized curriculum that is thoughtfully adapted to match the cognitive levels and grade levels of our students.

Our ultimate goal is to foster the holistic development of these children, ensuring that they are well-prepared to achieve their fullest potential. We place a strong emphasis on progress monitoring and evaluation, ensuring that we are consistently guiding these young individuals toward meaningful milestones.

Soma Manna, a 20-year-old with Cerebral Palsy, hails from an economically disadvantaged family in Kaptipada, Purba Medinipur. She relies on a wheelchair for mobility. For 14 years, she received comprehensive support at Asha Bhavan Centre CCI Children's Home, including ADL Training, Physiotherapy, Special Education, and more. Through dedicated physiotherapy, she gained the ability to crawl and achieved a significant milestone in 2023 by passing her Madhyamik Examination with guidance from special educators.

In 2023, Soma was reunited with her family, which boosted her self-confidence and determination. Now, she actively participates in group activities and continues her education from home. Her unwavering commitment to self-empowerment sets her on a path to a brighter future, overcoming the challenges presented by her condition and her family's financial constraint. Soma's resilience and the support of Asha Bhavan Centre have been instrumental in her journey towards independence and self-sufficiency.



"DISHA" early intervention and school readiness scheme under The National Trust.

The DISHA scheme is a comprehensive initiative focused on offering early intervention and school readiness support to children aged 0-10 with disabilities, in accordance with the National Trust Act. (For the welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities) Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India. At its core, DISHA centers provide a range of essential services, including specialized therapies, training programs, and support for families, tailored to the unique needs of these children. This center offers day-care facilities to 26 children with disabilities. The DISHA Project aims to empower children with disabilities, preparing them for school while promoting inclusivity and accessibility across different economic backgrounds.

Case Story of Afia under Disha Scheme.

Afia Tarana, a 6-year-old with Cerebral Palsy and mild mental retardation, faced challenges since birth due to complications, including birth asphyxia and neonatal jaundice. Living in Karatberia Village with her father, Amirul Ali, a jori worker earning approximately Rs. 5,000/- monthly. When she was 9 months old the family understands her developmental issues and visited doctors. And when she was 1 year old she came to Asha Bhavan Centre and Admitted under DISHA Early Intervention programme. Afia, initially unable to walk and reliant on her mother, underwent three years of therapy, at the age of 4 she achieve independent walking. At present she is engaging in Special Education and Physiotherapy, she now attends class-V in her village Government school. Her improved daily living skills, independence, and social behavior bring joy to her family and community, expressing gratitude to Asha Bhavan Centre for transformative guidance and support. Hopeful for Afia's continued progress, her family envisions a future marked by independence and potential development.



Community Based Rehabilitation Programme

Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) aims to empower individuals with disabilities for complete community integration. Asha Bhavan Centre's initiative, which began in the late 1990s, not only addresses disabilities but also fosters broader community development. Operating across remote West Bengal villages, the program caters to marginalized individuals, focusing on disabilities while also enhancing healthcare, education, and employment opportunities. Through 24 years of dedicated service, Asha Bhavan Centre has effectively met the evolving needs of those with diverse disabilities, fostering their inclusion and empowerment within society.

Specific Objectives of the project:

Strengthening Children's Potential: Enhance the capabilities of children through the delivery of high-quality rehabilitation services.

Empowering Families and Community: Conduct training programs to empower families and the community, enabling them to effectively care for children within their local context.

Enhancing Maternal Mental Health: Improve the mental well-being of parents, particularly mothers, who have children with disabilities.

Promoting Inclusivity and Rights: Advocate for the rights of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) by fostering inclusive opportunities and facilitating their active participation in various aspects of life.

Sunera Case Study

Sunera, a 4-year-old with Cerebral Palsy, faced early challenges due to a premature birth with low birth weight and birth asphyxia. Hailing from a nuclear family in Loada village, Paschim Medinipur district, her father works as a laborer, while her mother is a homemaker.

At age 3, Sunera was brought to the Panskura Community Rehabilitation Centre, unable to stand or speak independently, relying on her mother for daily needs. Dedicated staff at the center assessed her condition comprehensively and initiated a tailored management program. Over time, Sunera has made remarkable progress, now walking without support and self-feeding. Though she communicates through sounds and pointing, her enthusiasm for bathing and following instructions shines.

Sunera's parents are delighted with her development, grateful to Asha Bhavan Centre for their constant support in this transformative journey towards a brighter future.



Project LEAP-CP (Learning through Everyday Activities with Parents for infants at high risk of Cerebral Palsy).

Project LEAP-CP, launched in March 2021 with the Support of Fosit Foundation, Rosi Foundation and ADL Foundation, in the target at Howrah district, serves 1.2 million people in 342 villages across 6 blocks. It targets early intervention for infants at high risk of cerebral palsy, emphasizing community-based parent-delivered care while assessing its impact on caregiver mental health. The project aims to detect high-risk infants within their first year to maximize treatment effectiveness and promotes community awareness and maternal mental well-being. The intervention employs family-centered approaches, focusing on goal-directed tasks, home-based care, active motor learning, and enhancing home environments. Parent coaching principles encourage caregiver empowerment.

Community Disability Workers identify high-risk infants after sensitizing government health workers. Assessments, validated by a Quality Controller, determine enrollment. CDWs conduct fortnightly home visits, following the LEAP-CP guidance book, with weekly training sessions ensuring adherence. The program technically carried by Dr Kathrin A. Benfer, Postdoctoral Research Fellow & Speech Pathologist of The University of Queensland, Queensland Cerebral Palsy and Rehabilitation Research Centre (QCPRRC).

Case Study Arghya:

Arghya Saote, a young child from the Baral area in Shyampur, Howrah. His journey with the LEAP-CP project began when an ASHA community worker alerted the team about his developmental concerns. Arghya's birth history was marked by high-risk factors, including delayed cry, convulsions, and asphyxia, prompting further investigation.

Initially, a General Movement Assessment (GMA) at three months appeared reassuring, but a subsequent evaluation using the HINE assessment revealed developmental delays. Arghya struggled with fundamental skills such as sitting, maintaining balance, standing, and walking independently.

In response, the LEAP-CP team set specific developmental goals for Arghya and embarked on an intervention journey. They engaged with Arghya's parents, Asiranjan and Chandana Saote, teaching them how to support his progress at home. Their steady commitment, coupled with professional guidance, yielded significant results.

Today, Arghya has made remarkable strides. He can sit with support, stand while holding on, and even take assisted steps. His fine motor skills have improved substantially, enabling him to grasp toys and manipulate objects. Furthermore, he can now communicate with his parents and demonstrate imitation skills.

Arghya's life has undergone a transformation, thanks to the intervention and his parents' dedication. The LEAP-CP project remains dedicated to further enhancing his development and future prospects.



State Nodal Agency Center (SNAC) under The National Trust.

The State Nodal Agency Center (SNAC) is a significant initiative introduced in India during the pilot phase of 2003-04 and subsequently expanded and enhanced. Its primary mission is to address the needs of individuals with disabilities, particularly in remote and underserved areas of the country. SNACs actively collaborate with state governments to raise awareness about the National Trust and advocate for the inclusion of the four National Trust disabilities in state budget allocations.

Asha Bhavan Centre has been serving as a SNAC since 2017, acting as a crucial bridge between the state and central ministries to enhance the well-being of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs). We function as data repositories, maintaining essential databases that are vital for effective planning and resource allocation. Furthermore, SNACs facilitate the functioning of Local Level Committees (LLCs), ensuring their effective support for individuals with disabilities at the grassroots level. These centers also actively engage in sensitization programs aimed at various stakeholders.

This year, Asha Bhavan Centre has successfully facilitated the formation of online LLCs in 23 districts of West Bengal, and we have initiated online applications and processing of Legal Guardianship Certificates in all the districts of West Bengal.

- I. The SLCC (State Level Coordination Committee) was reconstituted on April 13, 2022, and held two meetings (April 22, 2022, and December 14, 2022).
- II. Asha Bhavan Centre facilitated the formation of online LLCs in all West Bengal districts within a month of reconstitution, participating in 30 LLC meetings from April 2022 to May 2023.
- III. A virtual State Level Meeting involving District Authorities from all 23 districts was held on May 20, 2022, to discuss National Trust issues.
- IV. A meeting with RAKSHA TPA and ROs took place on March 10, 2023.
- V. Seven district-level meetings were organized with block-level officers and district officials to promote National Trust activities, reaching 166 state government officials in 12 districts.
- VI. Five District Level Training Programs were conducted to sensitize CCI Homes, SWADHER GREH, and after-care home management committee staff on Legal Guardianship and NIRAMAYA enrollment.
- VII. A Registered Organization (RO) meeting was held on January 31, 2023, with 51 organizations present.
- VIII. A meeting with parents took place on June 3, 2022, where 52 parents and RO staff discussed NIRAMAYA and Guardianship.
- IX. On October 12, 2022, a parent sensitization program was held at RO Birpara Social Welfare Organization in Alipurduar District.
- X. On October 19, 2022, the SNAC Coordinator visited Manovikash Kendra in Kolkata District, engaging around 110 parents in discussions about Legal Guardianship and NIRAMAYA.
- XI. The SNAC supported two new organizations to register under the National Trust Act, one from North Dinajpur and another from Coochbihar.
- XII. The SNAC assisted in enrolling 1029 beneficiaries under the NIRAMAYA scheme.
- XIII. IEC (Information, Education, and Communication) materials were developed in Bengali and included audio-visual materials to explain Legal Guardianship and NIRAMAYA procedures, distributed to district administrations for dissemination.

Orthopedic Workshop Supported by: ADL, Switzerland.

Persons with disabilities often encounter unique challenges that affect their daily lives and hinder their ability to perform routine activities independently. The provision of aids and appliances plays a pivotal role in addressing these challenges, aiming to enhance the quality of life and promote inclusivity. Legal mandates emphasize the necessity of aids for equal opportunities, reflecting a commitment to building a genuinely inclusive society where unique challenges are recognized and addressed effectively.

With the generous support of ADL in Switzerland, Asha Bhavan Center operates an orthopedic workshop aimed at enhancing the mobility and quality of life for children and individuals with disabilities. This workshop serves as a hub for providing essential aids and appliances such as specialized chairs, customized wheelchairs, and tricycles, among other assistive devices. These resources are distributed to a wide range of beneficiaries, including children residing in our care facilities, students attending special schools, individuals benefiting from Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) programs, as well as directly supporting persons with disabilities within disadvantaged communities.

Positive Impact of Ruhunika

Ruhunika Khatun, an 8-year-old from Panskura, affected with Cerebral Palsy, hindering her daily activities since childhood. In a family of four, her father is a small shop keeper, her mother a homemaker, with a younger sister. Seeking assistance from the Asha Bhavan Centre Orthopaedic workshop, a comprehensive assessment led to a targeted intervention plan. This included regular therapy, which she receiving from ABC's Community Rehabilitation Centre, a customized wheelchair, spinal supportive brace, and bilateral adaptive supra malleoli orthosis. The wheelchair aimed to enhance sitting balance, facilitate feeding, control deformities, improve communication, and boost respiratory function. Results are promising - Ruhunika now sits independently in the wheelchair, effectively controlling deformity progression. This case underscores the positive impact of personalized interventions, showcasing collaborative efforts in improving mobility and overall quality of life for those facing neurological challenges like Cerebral Palsy.



Open Shelter for Girl's Under the Ministry of Women and Child Development is implementing a Centrally Sponsored Scheme "Mission Vatsalya" erstwhile Child Protection Services (CPS) Scheme.

Asha Bhavan Centre running "Open Shelter" project under "Mission Vatsalya" since 1st December 2022. This project plays a vital role in the protection and rehabilitation of vulnerable children, ensuring they have access to a safe and nurturing environment, education, and healthcare. It is a crucial step toward safeguarding the rights and well-being of children in need of immediate care and protection. This project places a strong focus on rehabilitation and reintegration efforts, aiming to reunite children with their families. Moreover, it offers emotional support and counseling to help children overcome trauma while equipping them with life skills and vocational training to enable their self-reliance and successful social inclusion. Under the Project we run one Main Center at Kathila, Under Uluberia Municipality Word no 30 and three Contact Point at (I.) Nimdighi Bazar Contact Point Ward No. 28, (II.) Gangarampur Contact Point, Uttar Gangarampur Cultural & Athletic Club Ward No. 31 and (III.) Banitala Contact Point Ward No. 31, of Uluberia Municipality.

Saima Khatun, a 10-year-old Muslim girl, grew up in the impoverished slums of Banitala, Howrah. Despite being enrolled in school, her interest in education was initially minimal, with no grasp of basic concepts like Bengali 'Barna Mala' or English 'Alphabet.'

However, her life took a remarkable turn when she started attending an open shelter on December 1st. In this safe haven, Saima underwent a profound transformation.

One notable change was her return to education. Initially, she had abandoned school for laborious work to support her family. Through consistent counseling and support, Saima enthusiastically re-enrolled in class IV at Kathila Primary School, attending regularly and making stride in her studies.

Another visible transformation was in her personal hygiene. Once neglectful, she now maintains her health and cleanliness, taking daily baths and following a routine. Most heartwarming is the change in her attitude. Saima's newfound thirst for knowledge, positive relationships with peers, and respect for elders are all evident.

Saima Khatun's story illustrates the profound impact of support, education, and a nurturing environment of a vulnerable child's life. Her resilience and determination shine as a beacon of hope for a brighter future, reminding us of the transformative power of care and intervention.



School Project Bodhoday Vidya Mandir (BVM)
to promote the Education in Rural Bengal.

In 2002, the objective of Asha Bhavan Centre for quality primary education for underprivileged children in remote location turns up with the support of philanthropist Dominique Lapierre. Under the Bodhoday Vidya Mandir banner, 10 schools emerged, spanning from Mathabhanga of Cooch Behar to Laxmikantapur of South 24 Parganas district. Enduring challenges like flooding and cyclones, the project has continued its mission, currently benefiting 1,804 students. International support from organizations like OFI, Association Ali Baba & You, Switzerland, and Lumilo Foundation and parents participation continuing its operations. And in FY 2022-2023, OFI's backing facilitated the construction of three new classrooms in Bodhoday Vidya Mandir, Marokhana, Hooghly District, reinforcing education accessibility in a flood-prone area at the junction of Hooghly, Howrah, and Paschim Medinipur districts.

His father's migration for work did not diminish Mehedi's commitment to education. After completing higher secondary education at Al Islah School, Domkal, and preparing for the UG NEET exam, Mehedi sought to break the cycle of poverty.

In 2023, he achieved a significant milestone by passing the All India Postal Services Examination, securing a permanent position as a Gramin Dak Sevak. This success marked a pivotal moment, not only altering Mehedi's destiny but also transforming the prospects of his entire family. His journey exemplifies the transformative power of education and resilience in the face of adversity, illustrating how one individual's determination can bring about positive change for an entire family.



Supplementary Education Project School Coaching for underprivileged Children.

To offer additional support and guidance to primary school students from underprivileged and disadvantaged backgrounds who are enrolled in public schools, we currently operate 20 coaching centers that are operating at full capacity with the Support of AVTM, France. These coaching centers have had a significant impact on the students, as they attend these classes with enthusiasm, engage in school tasks, and participate actively in their public school education.

Over time, we have seen a remarkable reduction in dropout rates within the project's designated area, thanks to the trust and confidence we have built among the parents and the local village education committee. As a result of our efforts, primary school graduates from these coaching centers have successfully transitioned to local high schools and have continued their pursuit of higher education. Many of these students have even completed their college degrees and have entered the workforce, securing respectable positions in various industries. They now lead fulfilling lives, proudly contributing to their communities and society at large.

Here, education is not just about academics; it is a transformative journey that prepares students for a life beyond the classroom, instilling values that extend beyond the confines of the school premises. 97 student enrolled in the year.



Supplementary Nutrition Program

Provide Supplementary Food to Malnourished Children

In a bold quest to nourish the malnourished Children and Children with Disabilities in the society especially in marginalised community, Supplementary Nutrition Division of Asha Bhavan Centre conducts year long program with gracious support of organisation AVTM, France. The division regularly screening targeted hundred twelve children, mapping their Body Mass Index (BMI) and prepare accordingly food chart enriched with nutritious values. Besides these to make aware the parents especially mothers, nutritionist regularly arranges awareness program through audio visual methods that helped beneficiaries to follow advisories for the utmost development of their children. 105 Children are benefitted through out the year.



Teachers' Training Program
Diploma in Special Education for Intellectual Disability
Affiliated by RCI, Govt. of India.

The Diploma in Special Education for Intellectual Disability helps trainees to understand disabilities specifically intellectually disabilities and how they affect learning. It covers typical student growth and the psychological aspects of education. The program also teaches about different teaching strategies and methods for the Children with ID. It shows how to use tools to assess students and plan interventions. It equips educators with practical skills and knowledge to create inclusive and effective learning environments for children with ID.

Since 2016, Asha Bhavan Centre has been conducting a specialized course affiliated with the Rehabilitation Council of India. Over 100 students have been trained, equipping them to promote special education in remote areas of the state. This initiative contributes to the dissemination of inclusive and special education practices and addresses the educational needs of children with disabilities.



Sampa be a Special Educator.

Sampa Halder, Born in 2002, she faces locomotor disabilities since birth but finds joy in listening to music, dancing, crafting handmade jewellery and beautician during her leisure time. However, her transformative journey began when she took admission at Asha Bhavan Centre Children's Home on January 7, 2010. Aspiring to be a teacher and support fellow children with disabilities, Sampa achieved a notable victory in the 5/A side Unified Football Competition of Special Olympics Bharat in September 2021. Over the course of 13 years, she received comprehensive support, including education and various services.

In 2020, Sampa earned the prestigious Birangana Award, marking a significant achievement in her life. Restoring back to her family in 2022, she didn't let her challenges hinder her aspirations. Sampa resumed her education by enrolling in the Special Diploma in Education Course at Asha Bhavan Centre, showcasing remarkable resilience and an unwavering commitment to self-empowerment through education. Her story exemplifies achievement over adversity and the transformative impact of dedicated support.



“SADHANA” Inclusive Skill Development Vocational Training Centre
(Working for sustainable development for Divyangjan and Economically Backwarded women in Rural and Tribal area in India)

Asha Bhavan Centre operates the SADHANA Inclusive Vocational Training Centre on its Kathila main campus. The primary goal of this initiative is to empower marginalized communities, particularly young adults with disabilities and women from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, enabling them to become self-sufficient and active contributors to society.

The program focuses on providing vocational skills to these beneficiaries, equipping them with the tools they need to earn a sustainable livelihood and achieve financial independence. Within the vocational unit of the Asha Bhavan Centre, several skill-based units are established, each serving a specific purpose:

- 1.) Tailoring Unit: This unit provides training in tailoring and sewing, empowering individuals to acquire the skills needed for clothing production and repair. 26 Number of Trainee received the Training.
- 2.) Handmade Paper Craft Unit: This unit specializes in creating handmade paper crafts, offering beneficiaries an opportunity to develop artistic skills and produce unique handcrafted items. 07 Number of Trainee received the Training.
- 3.) Organic Holi Making Unit: Participants in this unit engage in the creation of organic Holi colors, emphasizing environmental sustainability and the production of safe and eco-friendly products. 15 Number of Trainee received the Training.
- 4.) Junk Jewelry Making Unit: Beneficiaries in this unit learn the art of crafting jewelry from recycled materials, promoting creativity while contributing to eco-conscious jewelry production. 11 Number of Trainee received the Training.

Through these vocational units, the Asha Bhavan Centre strives to foster self-reliance, skill development, and economic independence among its beneficiaries, ultimately enhancing their quality of life and enabling them to actively participate in and contribute to society. 59 Women received the skill development training through above mentioned four trades.



“Sadhana” Integrated Child Development Program for rural malnourished children.

In response to the pervasive malnutrition crisis in India, our initiative, the Dairy Firm at Kerodanga Centre, was launched in January 2023, under the banner of “Integrated Child Development Program” to provide glass of Fresh Cow Milk to malnourished children to uphold vision of “Kuposhan Mukht Bharat Abhiyan”. The project buoyed by generous support from Students, Friends and Family members of Prof. Dr. Shankar Nath Mukherjee. The venture aimed to address the crisis aggravated by economic disparities and insufficient access to nutritious food. With the benevolence of our donors, we successfully established a cow shelter and introduced ten cows, resulting in a substantial daily yield of 70-80 liters of milk on an average. This abundant supply, complemented by the inclusion of bananas, plays a pivotal role in meeting the nutritional needs of 250 children.

“Sadhana” Health Program

To Promote low cost health facility through Homeopathy Dispensary.

In August 2022, a philanthropic homeopathy dispensary was inaugurated at the Keoradanga campus of Asha Bhavan Center in South 24 Parganas. This noble effort came to fruition through the generous financial support extended by the Kolkata Senior Citizen Forum. The dispensary is now actively serving the community, bringing valuable health benefits to those in need. 835 villagers received treatment from the dispensary from August 2022 to March 2023.



Sponsorship Programme

To cater to the specific needs of economically disadvantaged children with disabilities and meritorious students, we have initiated a distinctive Sponsorship Program. This initiative is primarily supported by individual donors, trust, foundation and company in India, who contribute to providing tailored educational, medical, nutritional, and rehabilitation assistance based on the unique requirements of each child with disabilities and students. At present through this programme we support 45 children with disabilities in rural area.



"Swawlamban" State sponsored scheme GOWB.

Transforming Lives Through Empowerment and Skill-building of underprivileged women in society.

Swawlamban, a state-sponsored initiative, aims to empower socially distressed women, girls, and transgender individuals aged 18-35. In collaboration with NGOs, the scheme provides vocational training, emphasizing economic participation and skill development. Focused on those vulnerable to immoral trafficking, Swawlamban seeks to generate income, offer entrepreneurship development training, and foster small enterprises. The program aligns with broader objectives such as creating viable markets, leveraging local government resources, and providing alternative employment opportunities. Swawlamban serves as a vital step towards economic empowerment and holistic development for marginalized individuals.

In the current year, Asha Bhavan Centre conducted a six-month Soft Toy Making training program under the Swawlamban Scheme, benefiting 22 underprivileged women, including those with disabilities. Commencing in July 2022 and concluding in January 2023, the program aimed to empower women to become contributors to their families and society. Successfully completing the training, all participants acquired the necessary skills in Soft Toy Making, enhancing their capacity to make a positive impact in both their households and the broader community. This initiative exemplifies Asha Bhavan Centre's commitment to skill development and socio-economic empowerment for underprivileged women, fostering self-sufficiency and societal contribution.

Social Entrepreneurship Program for women in rural areas of West Bengal Through a goat farming program.

The project “Goat Farming” intends with support of OFI to promote the formation of JLGs (Joint Liability Groups) and through it, generate Income for the rural women by means of Goat farming. At Bishnupur, Village: Bishnupur, P.O.: Bishnupur, P.S.: Margram, Dist.: Birbhum, PIN: 731244, West Bengal, India. 20 women directly benefitted from this project.

Context of the Project: This project is part of the larger program of Financial Sustainability of the BVM Bishnupur School. The objective is to ensure that the parents of the children studying in the schools are financially capable to pay for their children’s school fees and this in turn will ensure that the School is also financially self-sustainable.

Through this project, the aim is to empower underprivileged women in rural areas of West Bengal by the creation of Joint-Liability Groups (JLGs). The JLGs are groups of marginalized women / parents of the children attending the BVM school of ABC and those who are living under the poverty line. The approach will be for these women to come together to share their resources and gain access to public microcredit, while at the same time, generate income through Goat Farming. The microcredits which are provided by the government enable them to create their own economic activity, and hence to increase their family’s income.

A new vocational training classroom at Asha Bhavan Centre has been constructed through the generous support of honorable MP Mrs. Sajda Ahammed from the MP LADS fund (26-Ulu-beria-PC, 17th Lok Sabha). The sanctioned amount of Rs. 500,000/- facilitated the completion of the project, executed under work order no 218/Plan dated 30.05.22. This facility now serves students from the Open Shelter for Girls, empowering them with vocational courses for future economic independence. The initiative underscores the commitment to skill development and enhancing opportunities for the community.

This year, seven dedicated volunteers from France, including Juleat Rambolt (Physiotherapist), Marilou Lamy (Special Educator) Noriane Maitre (Physiotherapist), Chloe Tran Hong (Social Worker), Samantha Delgal (Special Educator), and Estell Seignard (Occupational Therapist), and Manno Bosard (Individual Social Worker) committed volunteering with us. These volunteers bring their unique skills and capabilities to serve children in our program. The collaboration fosters the exchange of knowledge, skills, and social contexts, creating a dynamic and enriching environment for both the volunteers and the children. This initiative not only supports rehabilitation efforts but also promotes cultural and professional exchange between French volunteers and the local community.

Asha Bhavan Centre collaborates with SUPSI, the University of Switzerland, providing internship support to final-year students. This initiative aims to offer practical experience in a low and middle-income country. In the current year, Chaira and Nicole, students from the Physiotherapy Section at SUPSI, successfully completed a 3-month internship program with Asha Bhavan Centre. This partnership not only benefits the students by exposing them to real-world challenges but also contributes to the organization's mission by integrating international perspectives into their programs. Such collaborative efforts foster cross-cultural learning and enrich the professional development of the participating students.



“Sports for Change” Inclusive Sports Academy.

With support of Fondazione Milan “AC Milan Fondazione” Italy and ADL under the motto of “Sports for Change” The Inclusive Sports ground and Multipurpose Court constructed within Kathila campus, Howrah.

The initiative began with coaching children in various sports, leading to remarkable achievements. In 2022, two girls represented Team India in football at the Special Olympic Unified Football Game in Detroit, USA, securing a bronze medal. And six more athletes (four in Football and two in Handball) being preparing to participate in world summer game which will be held in Berlin, Germany.

This project not only enhances physical well-being but also fosters inclusivity, sportsmanship, and noteworthy achievements, exemplifying the power of collaboration between organizations dedicated to making a positive impact on communities.

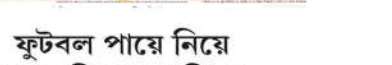

Dominique Lapierre, who gave Joy to City's name, passes away

Sumati Yengkhom & Priyanka Dasgupta | The French author Dominique Lapierre, whose 1981 novel 'City of Joy' gave Kolkata its most enduring sobriquet, died in France late on Sunday aged 87. The author, who shared a deep bond for Kolkata — finding joy amongst the poorest of the poor and making charity a calling decades before it became fashionable — was a Fulbright scholar. Until about a decade ago, while his health still permitted, he would regularly visit Kolkata, Howrah and the Sunderbans, where he ran several social welfare projects. 'City of Joy', which portrayed the struggles of a rich-haw-puller in Kolkata, was turned into a film starring Om Puri and Patrick Swayze in 1992. The shoot, however,



TOUCHING MANY LIVES He donated half the royalties he earned from 'City of Joy' to support humanitarian projects in Kolkata. Projects included centres for children with leprosy and polio, schools & hospitals. Royalties from 'Five Past Midnight in Shogal' go to a clinic in Shogal which provides treatment to victims of 1984 Union Carbide disaster. He also funded a school in Oriya Basti, a settlement described in 'Five Past Midnight in Shogal'. His commitment of reaching out to the have-nots, said Br Gaston Luyendard, who has been working in Liberia for an organisation called Prada. Br Gaston was living in the slum of Pilibana, working among the poor when Lapierre came calling at Mother Teresa's suggestion. Related report, P 2
